We are grateful that doses of the vaccine have reached our communities and were quickly administered to residents and co-workers. Our most vulnerable residents and co-workers were some of the first in the nation to receive the vaccine, and I am happy to report that none have experienced lasting serious side effects. Like many others, we hope this is the beginning of a return to some normalcy, but we suspect the lingering effects of COVID will be with us for some time.

There will be a vigorous discussion regarding the best balance of safety and quality of life. Isolation may have been necessary to save lives, but we must be determined to reconnect with one another in community. This is an essential ingredient that makes Homewood such a special place to call home.

Your continued prayers and support are appreciated as we continue to wrestle free of this awful pandemic. As we move ahead, we will often recall those we have lost and harken back to memories of their time with us as inspiration for pressing forward into a brighter future. ■

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## Resident Profile: Dennis Shaw

Homewood at Williamsport

For almost two years, Independent Living residents at Homewood at Williamsport have known "What's Up."

And that's all due to the efforts of Dennis Shaw, who combines his writing skills with a sense of humor and folksy charm to produce the biweekly publication.

Mr. Shaw, who moved to Homewood in the summer of 2018, said he wanted to be involved in the life of his new community. With a long career in newspapers, he decided his niche could be communications. So he pitched his idea for a newsletter to Executive Director Melissa Hadley, and the end result is "What's Up," a two-page newsletter—written and edited by Dennis, as he prefers to be called, with suggestions and assistance from staff members and fellow residents.

What's Up might include Resident Association news, an interview with a staff member, timely tips and reminders, birthdays and farewells. "It's very popular with residents," Dennis said, adding he gets requests to forward electronic versions to residents who winter in warmer climates so they can keep up with their Homewood home.

Dennis came by his newspaper career in an unusual fashion. After earning two degrees in German literature, and enjoying all that big city life in New York City had to offer, he decided to come to Hagerstown on the advice of friends living in the area. He secured a job as a printing apprentice at the *Herald Mail*. He moved up through the ranks in the production side of

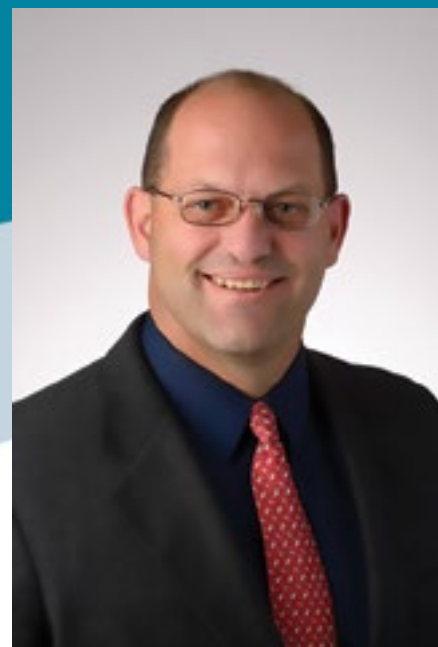

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newspapers, but he decided he really wanted to edit the news—not typeset what others wrote.

The managing editor told him before he could be an editor, he had to be a reporter. So that's what he did. He was eventually named the wire editor for the afternoon paper, *The Daily Mail*, and continued to move up the ranks ending his career as associate managing editor of *The Herald Mail*.

In the mid-1980s, Dennis took a leave of absence from the local newspaper to work as an editor for an English language newspaper in China. He was part of a team of native English speakers who edited English copy written by Chinese writers.

"This was before the Tiananmen Square incident," he said, when student-led demonstrators protested for greater freedom and democracy in the communist country. At the time he was there, he said he was surprised that the country was more "open" than he thought it would be. "But it was still a communist country."

After retiring from the *Herald Mail*, Dennis moved to a farm near Clear Spring, Maryland, until his move to Homewood.

"Homewood is a family," Dennis said. "I feel protected, secure and cared for." Dennis Shaw also knows "What's Up." ■

## Superheroes at Williamsport

**T**hey may not leap tall buildings in a single bound, but Kristie Frush believes Homewood at Williamsport co-workers are superheroes.

"That's really how we see them," she said. With both of her parents in different levels of care at Homewood at Williamsport, Kristie said she relies on the Homewood staff and they have never let her down.

"They are standing in the gap for us," she said, not just providing care, but acting as family especially in the face of the COVID-19 restrictions. And her family does whatever possible to ensure those co-workers know how much they are appreciated.

"I'm an only child and I live in Virginia so it's a great relief to me that they receive great care," Kristie said, adding she makes regular trips to Hagerstown to deliver things that her parents might need, along with special treats.

Jean Schlotterbeck, Kristie's mother, has been a resident in the health care center since suffering a stroke four years ago.

"She was in a different facility when she had the stroke and we asked for Homewood when it came time for rehab," Kristie said. The family was very happy that the rehab placement became permanent. The stroke affected her mother's speech as well as her mobility. But with therapy, Mrs. Schlotterbeck regained her speech abilities—a happy outcome because, "Mom likes to talk," her daughter said.

rehab that Allen Schlotterbeck made the decision to move to Homewood's assisted living. "Dad would come to visit Mom everyday so he already had friends here," Kristie said. She said the social interactions, even though they are limited due to COVID, have made a big difference in her dad's life.

"He's really enjoying the connections," she said, since prior to his move, he was living alone in the home he had shared with his wife of 67 years. Kristie said her parents were always very affectionate and the COVID separation has been difficult for them. The couple was blessed to be able to spend some time together when Mr. Schlotterbeck was in the rehab unit.

But Kristie said it is the work of the staff—especially during the past year—that makes Homewood such a special place. Staff members work so hard to help family stay in touch through phone calls, Face-time sessions and, when available, safe visits.

"When I bring personal items for my parents, it's the staff that picks up the packages and makes sure my parents have what they need," she said. Kristie said her mother has a small tree in her room that she decorates for holidays and seasons. "I send in the decorations and it's staff members who decorate it for her now," she said, as just one example of how co-workers are filling the gap offering comfort, smiles and encouragement.

And as difficult as COVID has been on families of residents, Kristie said she knows it has been equally difficult on staff. "Sometimes I get frustrated with COVID, but never with the staff."

"I want the staff to know they've persevered and we appreciate them," she said sending cards and notes of encouragement, "lots of pizza" and other tasty treats. Marketing Director Erin Younker said the family was the first to reach out in support of the staff after COVID hit.

"We really do see them as superheroes," Kristie said. ■

## Williamsport Auxiliary Update

COVID restrictions may have kept the Williamsport Auxiliary Executive Committee from meeting, but the pandemic has not stopped the organization from supporting the Health Care Center and its residents.

At Christmas, the Auxiliary provided more than \$1,000 worth of gifts for Operation Santa, as well as \$500 in funding for 12 Day of Christmas daily treats and hair care for health care center residents. In addition, the Auxiliary provided a one-year subscription to Ever-sound System. The Ever-sound System can enhance any listening experience for many of the residents. It is a wireless transmitting device with listening headphones and could be used for group time or even visitation with families. In addition, it gets monthly programming that can be used with residents. The package requested has 10 headphones and 2 transmitters for a yearly subscription plus a one-time setup fee.

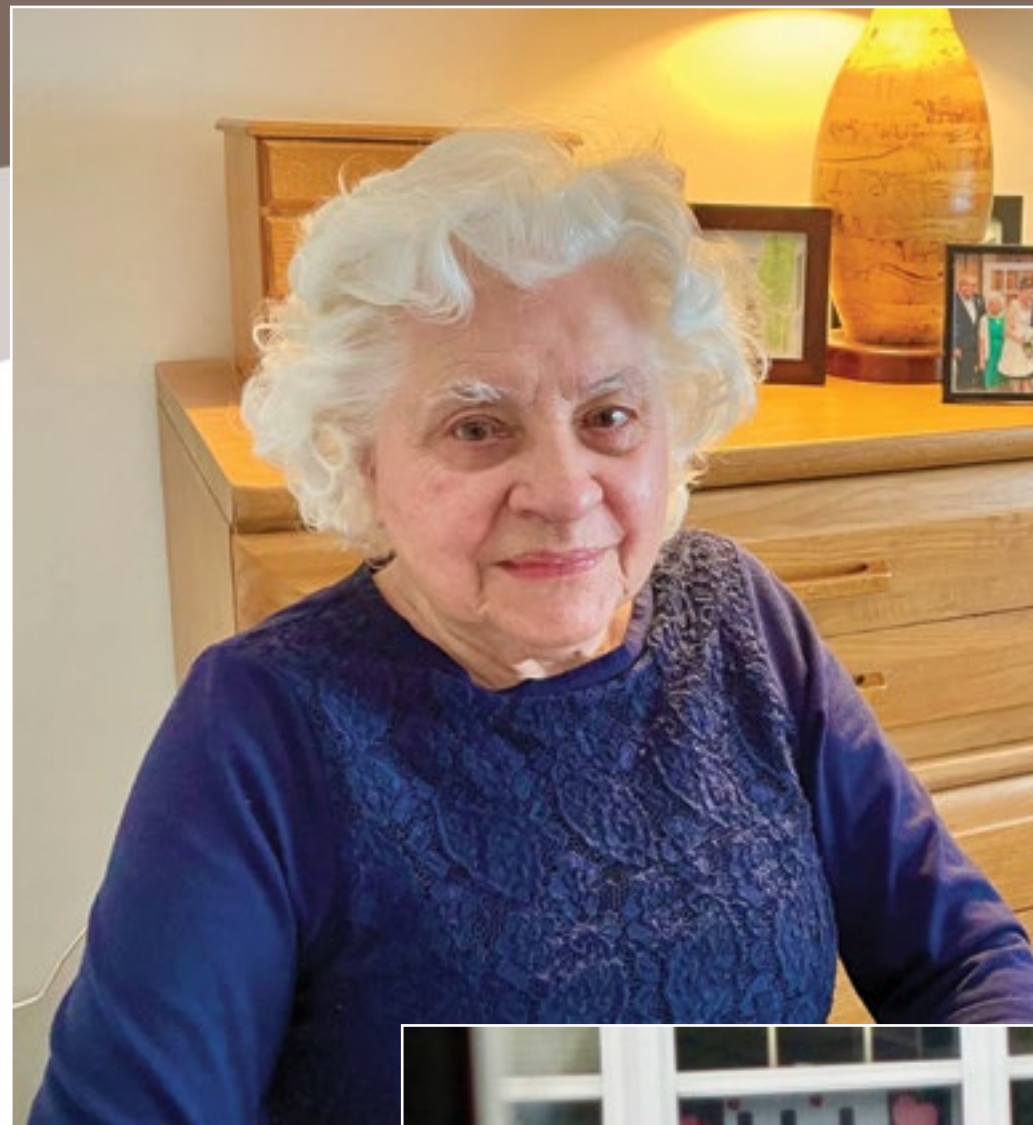

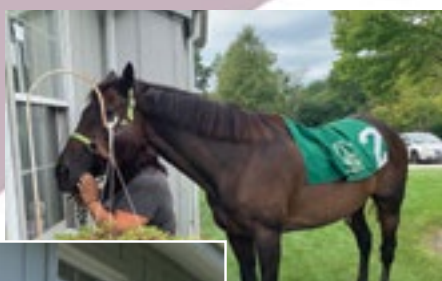

**A**t Homewood at Spring House Estates, you're always at home. Whether you're residing in one of our independent living cottages or apartments or our personal care facility, the Victoria House, you can always count on a sense of community and the feeling of home. Take it from one of our very own residents, May Wills, who has experienced both independent living and personal care amenities in recent months.

Mrs. Wills, who is 93 years old, has lived at Homewood at Spring House Estates for the last nine years. "My husband Bill and I made the decision to downsize and move to Homewood after it was becoming increasingly difficult to do tasks at home," she said. "He wasn't able to do certain things anymore and it was just time."

Mr. Wills has since passed, but Mrs. Wills continued to take advantage of the amenities, activities, and benefits of the community that she and the other residents at Homewood at Spring House Estates share. "My absolute favorite activity was our water volleyball team, before the pandemic happened," Mrs. Wills said. "I also enjoyed Wii Bowling, water aerobics, shuffleboard, bocce, cornhole... they really kept us busy!"

Recently, Mrs. Wills was hospitalized and her doctor had recommended spending some time in a personal care home, like the Victoria House. "May's doctor suggested she spend some time in our personal care home after being in the hospital for closer monitoring,"

said Ella Cessna, marketing director at Homewood at Spring House Estates. "Eventually, she will move back to her apartment in independent living right here on our campus."

Mrs. Wills was extremely grateful for the opportunity to still be able to come home to Homewood at Spring House Estates after her hospital visit. "I was so very happy that I could come home from the hospital to the Victoria House," she said. "It's wonderful to receive a higher level of care but still in a setting that you're familiar with and that feels just like home."

With the Victoria House offering assistance with daily meals, housekeeping, laundry, medication management and more, Mrs. Wills is getting the assistance she needs to get better and to eventually return home to her independent living apartment right on campus.

"They just treat you like a queen!" she said. "My medication is brought to me, I receive three meals a day, they take my vitals... It's all great and I'm very well taken care of."

Mrs. Wills' friends from independent living even came to visit, stopping by her window to say hello and building her a snowman to keep her company!

"The close community here has really meant a lot to me. I knew two people when I moved here, and now, I know almost everybody here, even in the cottages. We are a very close knit community and I have met some of the most lovely people. It's just a very friendly place overall." ■

## Homewood Golf Classics
